The subjects are planned to be presented and discussed within the summer school:

- Dynamics and Fundamentals of Islamic State
- Global Politics and Muslim World
- Religion- Politics Relation in Muslim World
- Global Political Economy and Muslim World
- · Alternative Approaches to Global Order
- Islamic Movements in Opposition and Governance
- The Social Dimensions of Transformation and New Issues

Besides the lectures, within the frame of the main theme of the program, there are three workshops which contain presentations and debates to provide the content and aim of the school. Students will also visit the historical places and academic foundations in the Istanbul. This year over 25 country 50 graduated students is participating in the program.

Keynote Address The Crisis of Social Sciences in the Muslim World

Sari Hanafi

American University of Beirut

In this keynote lecture the "The Crisis of Social Sciences in the Muslim World" will be questioned. The crisis of social science in the Muslim world does not stem from its epistemological underpinnings — related to the hegemony of the western [social science] theories — but from structural problems related to marginalization of the local production of knowledge and from legitimacy problems vis-a-vis religious knowledge. In this lecture Hanafi will focus a dependency path in the Islamic World that he named "publish globally and perish locally vs. publish locally and perish globally." According to him the 'dependency path' is still very strong, though with some exceptions.





Sari Hanafi is currently a Professor of Sociology at the American University of Beirut and editor of *Idafat: the Arab Journal of Sociology* (Arabic). He is also a member of the Executive Bureau of the International Association of Sociology and the Arab Council of Social Science. He holds a Ph. D. in Sociology from the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales-Paris, where he wrote his thesis entitled "Les ingénieurs en Syrie. Modernisation, technobureaucratie et identité," (1994). He has served as a visiting professor at the University of Poitiers and Migrintern (France), University of Bologna and Ravenna (Italy) and visiting fellow in CMI (Bergen-Norway). Hanafi was also the former Director of the Palestinian Refugee and Diaspora Centre (Shaml) from 2000-2004 and a former senior research at the Cairo-based French research center, Centre d'études et de documentation économique juridique et sociale (CEDEJ) from 1994-2000. He is the author of numerous journal articles and book chapters on the political and economic sociology of the Palestinian diaspora and refugees; sociology of migration; transnationalism; politics of scientific research; civil society and elite formation and transitional justice. Among his recent books are: *The Power of Inclusive Exclusion: Anatomy of Israeli Rule in The Occupied Palestinian Territories* (Edited with A. Ophir & M. Givoni, 2009) (English and Arabic) (NewYork: Zone Book; Beirut: CAUS), *The Emergence of A Palestinian Globalized Elite: Donors, International Organizations and Local NGOs* (Edited with L. Taber, 2005) (Arabic and English) and *Pouvoir et associations dans le monde arabe* (Edited with S. Bennéfissa, 2002) (Paris: CNRS).

The Islamic State and the Crises of the Political

Wael B. Hallag

Columbia University



The seminar is intended as a general treatment of the concept of the modern state within the larger theoretical framework in the humanities and the social sciences. It will then address the connections between this concept and Islamist ideology and political activity. We shall roughly follow the plan of the book, *The Impossible State*, as it is revealed in its table of contents, though expansions on its themes will be made.

- A preliminary discussion of the Enlightenment concept of reason, autonomy, morality, theory of progress, nostalgia, etc.
- 2. What is the modern state, and how is it different from pre--modern "states"?
- 3. A Return to the moral. How is modern morality different from pre--modern moralities? Is/ Ought distinction.
- The citizen as a moral agent and as the subject of the modern state. Sacrifice and modern education.
- 5. The technologies of the self.
- 6. Morality, Capitalism and Islamic Economics: A Basic Introduction
- 7. The Quran as a political and moral constitution. Orientalism interrogated.
- 8. General conclusions and final discussion.

Wael B. Hallaq is a scholar of Islamic law and Islamic intellectual history. His teaching and research deal with the problematic epistemic ruptures generated by the onset of modernity and the socio-politico-historical forces subsumed by it; with the intellectual history of Orientalism and the repercussions of Orientalist paradigms in later scholarship and in Islamic legal studies as a whole; and with the synchronic and diachronic development of Islamic traditions of logic, legal theory, and substantive law and the interdependent systems within these traditions. Hallaq's writings have explored the structural dynamics of legal change in pre-modern law, and have recently been examining the centrality of moral theory to understanding the history of Islamic law. His books include Ibn Taymiyya Against the Greek Logicians (1993); A History of Islamic Legal Theories: An Introduction to Sunni Usul al-fiqh (1997); Authority, Continuity and Change in Islamic Law (2001); and An Introduction to Islamic Law (2009). His latest work, Shari'a: Theory, Practice, Transformations (2009) examines the doctrines and practices of Islamic law within the context of its history, from its beginnings in seventh-century Arabia, through its development and transformation under the Ottomans, and across lands as diverse as India, Africa and South-East Asia, to the present. Hallaq's work has been widely read, and translated into Arabic, Persian, Turkish, Japanese, Indonesian and Hebrew.



Islam and Democracy

Muqtedar Khan

University of Delaware

Philosophical and Theoretical Challenges and Textual Opportunities:

This lecture will cover the philosophical gap between the Democracy as system of governance, as we know it today and Islam as Muslims interpret it today. It will examine the debate those who believe that Islam and democracy as compatible and those who see Islam as undemocratic. It will specially discuss Islamic sources that can advance a democratic Islam such as the constitution of Medina and Quranic verses that can be deployed in constructing an Islamic democracy.

Islamism and the Problem of Democratic Governance:

This lecture will begin by discussing the various challenges that plague the Muslim World – legitimacy, identity, authenticity and good governance. Subsequently in the light of the fall of the Morsi government in Egypt, the lecture shall explore the pathways and transitions ot democracy and its pitfalls in the contemporary Muslim World.





Muqtedar Khan, PhD (Georgetown University, 2000) joined the Department in 2005. His areas of interest are Politics of the Middle East and South Asia, Political Islam, Islamic Political Thought and American Foreign Policy in the Muslim World. Professor Khan teaches courses on Arab and Middle Eastern Politics, Politics of Development, Globalization, and Islam in World Affairs. Contemporary Muslim Political Thought: The Ethical Dimension

H. İbrahim Yenigün

Istanbul Commerce University

Most accounts of the contemporary Muslim political thought and Islamism study how Islamic creed bears out certain political projects to Islamicize the society and the state. This lecture will take on a different approach and examine their ethical dimension. The participants will probe and critically analyze the explicit or the implicit ethical perspectives in the key texts of contemporary Muslim political thought. How the thinkers' ethical notions cohere with their conceptions of Islamic creed and Islamic politics will be of crucial concern in these discussions aside from the merits of these ethical projects in and of themselves. Finally, a normative investigation on reconceiving Islamism first and foremost as an ethical project will follow.

Halil İbrahim Yenigün is Assistant Professor of Political Theory in the Department of International Relations at Istanbul Commerce University. He received his Ph.D. in August 2013 from the University of Virginia's (UVA) political theory program with his dissertation titled, *The Political Ontology of Islamic Democracy: An Ontological Narrative of Contemporary Muslim Political Thought.* Previously he served as the Middle East Relations Officer at the United Cities and Local Government's Middle East and West Asia branch (UCLG-MEWA) in 2011. From 2006 to 2010 he was the managing editor of the *American Journal of Islamic Social Sciences (AJISS).* He spent the 2007-2008 academic year as a Malone & Gallatin research fellow in the Middle Eastern Studies Center at American University in Cairo (AUC). Yenigün has published articles, book reviews, and opinion pieces in journals such as *İnsan ve Toplum (People & Society), Divan, The Virginia Quarterly Review (VQR), and AJISS.* His research is focused on political ontology, political theology, radical democracy, and comparative political theory with a specific focus on the contemporary Muslim political thought. His research interests also include the current religiously oriented youth movements in Turkey and Egypt. Yenigün is also involved in several NGOs that work on human rights, social justice issues, and free circulation of ideas.

The Future of Islamic State

Abdülvahap El Efendi

University of Westminster

A critique of modern Islamic political thought on the 'state', this lecture takes the form of a three-part dialogue with the West, with Islamic tradition and with 20th-century Muslim thinkers. The author discusses the divide between Islamic values and the basic principles which guide Western political thought. He traces the development of Muslim constitutional practice and considers the current debate on the nature of and desirability for an 'Islamic state'. He separates the problems that are internally derived from the by-products of Western culture. Dr El-Affendi argues that if Islamic values were brought to bear internationally, the entrenched dogmas of Western political thought as much as both the tradition-bound and modernist trends of Muslim thinking would have to be revised.





El-Efendi is a political scientist and writer who studied at the Universities of Khartoum, Wales and Reading. His published books include: "Turabi's Revolution: Islam and Power in Sudan", "Revolution and Political Reform in Sudan", "Rethinking Islam and Modernity", "For a State of Peace: Conflict and the Future of Democracy in Sudan" and "The Conquest of Muslim Hearts and Minds: Perspectives on U.S. Reform and Public Diplomacy Strategies". In 2004, he was a member of the core team of authors of the 2004 Arab Human Development Report: Towards Freedom in the Arab World" and was a member of advisory board. He is also co-author of the report: Contextualising Islam in Britain: Exploratory Perspectives. He has articles and papers published in numerous leading magazines and journals including The International Journal of Middle Eastern Studies', 'African Affairs', 'Journal of International Affairs,' Encounter,' The Muslim World', 'Journal of Intervention and Statebuilding', 'Harvard Middle Eastern and Islamic Review' and 'Contemporary Arab Affairs'. He was given the Muslim News Allama Iqbal award for Creativity in Islamic Thought in 2006. In 2009, he was awarded an ESRC Fellowship for his contributions to the 'Global Uncertainties Program and selected as a member of British Muslims and Islamophobia Commission.

The Nation State and Beyond

Moderator: Murat Çemrek, Necmettin Erbakan University

This workshop will criticize nation-state fact and its results in a nation-state based international system. The papers which will be presented within the workshop, will inquiry problematical dimensions of nation-state centric World and World politics perception. The main question of the workshop is how to cope with nation-state or sovereign state based World system. The possibility of a new World order without nation-states or sovereign states and alternative approaches to this dominant paradigm of international politics will be discussed in details through paper presentations.



Social and Political Change in Muslim World

Moderators: Lutfi Sunar, Istanbul University / M. Hüseyin Mercan, Erciyes University / Michelangelo Guida, 29 Mayıs University

This workshop will focus on the political and social structure and transformation theme in the Islamic world. Commencement of the evaluation of the global politics within a new context after the September 11 attacks and the change and transformation problematic remaining seriously on the agenda with the civil rebellions encountered in the Arabic countries arise significant questions regarding the transformation in the political attitude and political structure within the Islamic world. Within this context, the participants to be included within this workshop will perform discussions on subjects regarding the grounds, dynamics and results of the political transformation.

The State and Economy in Muslim World

Moderators: Necmettin Kızılkaya, Istanbul University

The economic affairs of the Islamic world will be mainly addressed within the scope of this workshop. The economic change, transformation and developments will be examined within the scope of its relation to politics particularly within the scope of the recent structural changes in the political arena and the priorities of the global system. Field-based studies devoted to the country and region as well as theoretical studies on economy politics area will also be opened up to presentations and discussions.
